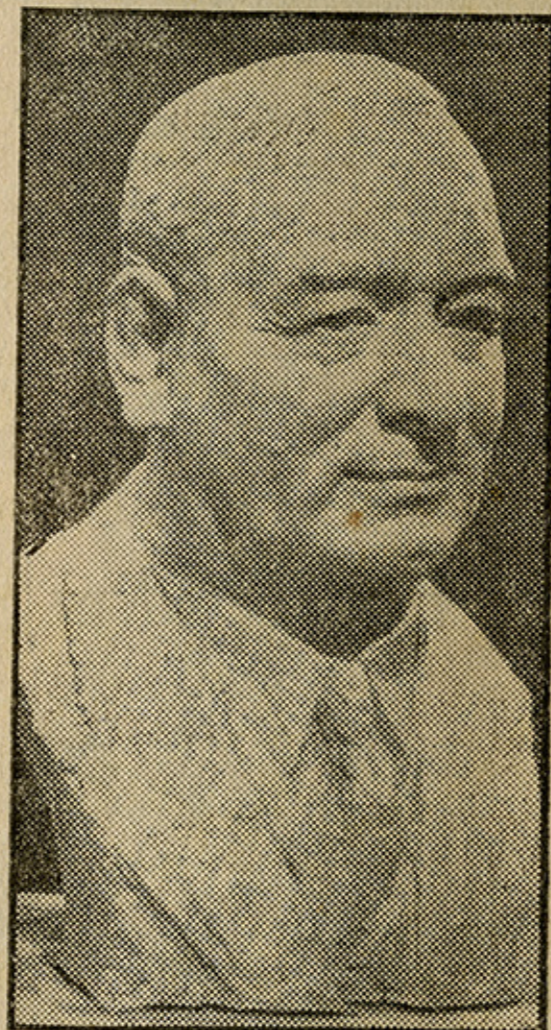

Summer Course For Teachers From South East Asia

Five Hongkong women teachers left the Colony by B.O.A.C. plane yesterday morning to take part in a specially planned course at Wall Hall Training College, Hertfordshire.

This course, the first of its kind, has been organised by the Colonial Office and will be attended by 25 women teachers from Government and mission and private schools in Hongkong, the Federation of Malaya, Singapore, Sarawak and North Borneo.

The members of the Hongkong group are Mrs K. F. Cheung, of the Senior Vernacular Middle School, Miss Magdalen Tiu, of Wanchai P.M. School, Miss L. Wong, of St. Mary's School, Kowloon; Miss Sarah Abdullah, of the Diocesan Girls' School, and Miss Janet Collom, of St. Joseph's College.

The purpose of the course is to demonstrate modern educational techniques as practised in the United Kingdom. It will provide an opportunity for discussing the purpose and practice of education and the adaptation of British methods to the local needs of the territories, under the skilled guidance of well qualified staff at the training college.

Most of the time will be spent at Wall Hall, a residential college at Aldenham in Hertfordshire. The ten weeks programme will include visits to Educational Institutions, discussions and lectures on educational topics, and also practical work in Art Craft and Music. Each teacher will also have the benefit of special instruction in the optional individual course.

It has been arranged that the teachers shall have about two "workless weeks" in the United Kingdom before starting the course in order that they may become accustomed to conditions in England. They will be met on arrival in London and accommodation—possibly in some small market town—has been arranged for them. During this time of "settling in" they will be given talks on social conditions in England and will go on excursions enabling them to study conditions at first hand.

During their stay they will visit at least one of the older Universities, Oxford or Cambridge. Many of their friends in Hongkong will envy them their chance of seeing something of the Festival of Britain this summer.
