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## Message from the Chairman

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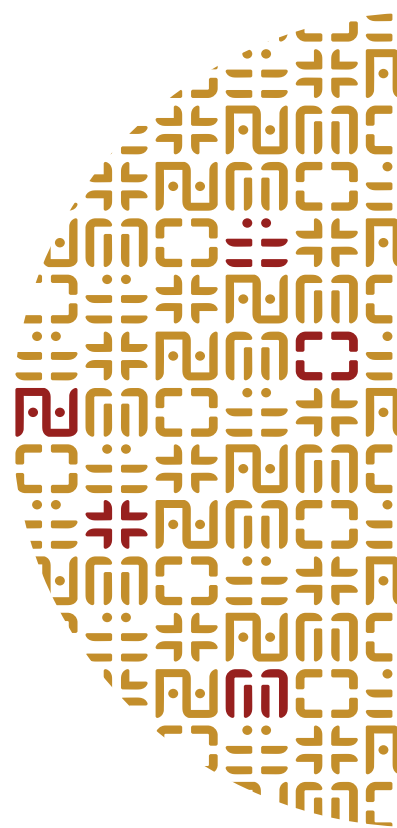
This is the first Annual Report of the Hong Kong Intangible Cultural Heritage (ICH) Funding Scheme. As the chairman of the Assessment Panel, I am very pleased to introduce to you the work and overview of Hong Kong ICH Funding Scheme in 2019 and 2020.

Since its launch in 2019, the Hong Kong ICH Funding Scheme has been well received. We have supported over 70 projects in the past two years, including research and publication, public and educational activities, transmission courses, festivals and other types of activities, with total funding of over HK\$67 million.

It was challenging for Hong Kong in 2019 and 2020. The social events and COVID-19 have hindered our funded projects, which as a result were not able to progress as scheduled. Nevertheless, as the proverb goes, “every cloud has a silver lining”. We will continue to strengthen the measures to safeguard and promote Hong Kong’s ICH by upholding the beliefs and purpose of the scheme. I hope everyone will continue to support our work.

## Background and Purpose

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On 17 October 2003, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization adopted the *Convention for the Protection of Intangible Cultural Heritage* (the Convention), which not only defines intangible cultural heritage (ICH), but also provides guidelines for concerned parties to safeguard ICH. Since the entry into force of the Convention, the Government of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region (HKSAR) has introduced a series of measures in accordance with the guidelines of the Convention. While ensuring the transmission of local ICH, it also encourages more public participation in measures to safeguard ICH. Key measures include the setting up of the ICH Advisory Committee in 2008, the announcement of the first ICH Inventory of Hong Kong (comprising 480 items) in 2014, the establishment of the ICH Office in 2015, the setting up of the Hong Kong ICH Centre in the Sam Tung Uk Museum in 2016 and the promulgation of the first Representative List of the ICH of Hong Kong in 2017.

In addition, in the 2018-19 Budget the HKSAR Government proposed to allocate \$300 million to strengthen the safeguarding, promotion and transmission of ICH. The Finance Committee of the Legislative Council approved funding of \$300 million in late 2018 to launch the ICH Funding Scheme, which aims to engage the community and strengthen various aspects of safeguarding work for the ICH of Hong Kong. The Assessment Panel is set up under Intangible Cultural Heritage Advisory Committee, to assess applications and the proposed budgets of the scheme, and to monitor the implementation of the funded projects. 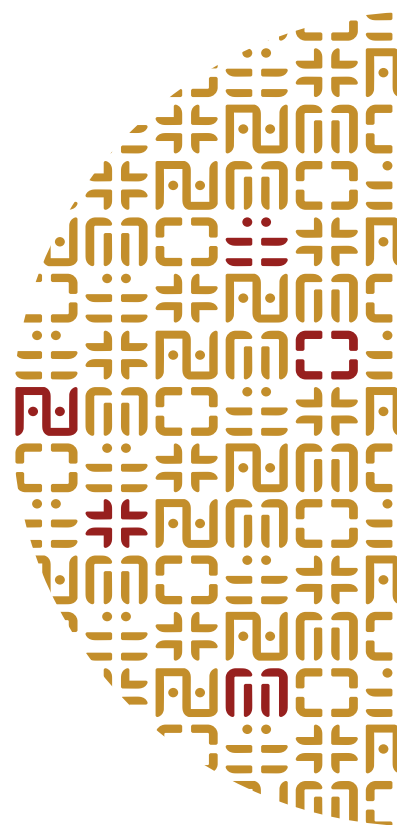
The objective of the ICH Funding Scheme is to support local individuals and organisations with relevant experience and qualifications in carrying out ICH-related projects, with a view to achieving the following goals:

- to strengthen the safeguarding of, research into, education about, and promotion and transmission of local ICH items;
- to support the transmission of ICH by local bearers and bearer organisations;
- to engage the community's participation in the safeguarding of ICH; and
- to enhance public awareness and understanding of ICH and boost respect for ICH.

The ICH Funding Scheme comprises the “Community-driven Projects” and “Partnership Projects”. The “Community-driven Projects” welcome individuals or organisations from the community to propose meaningful projects and support the community in participating and implementing projects related to ICH, so that ICH can be popularised and transmitted throughout the community in the hope of raising public awareness of ICH as a result. The ICH Funding Scheme mainly supports individuals or non-profit-making organisations that can transmit or promote ICH; the scope of funding covers projects related to the Representative List of the ICH and the ICH inventory of Hong Kong.

The “Partnership Projects” refer to the specific topics formulated by the ICH Office after consultation with the ICH Advisory Committee. Eligible individuals and organisations are invited to submit applications to act as partners with the ICH Office to implement designated projects.

The “Community-driven Projects” and “Partnership Projects” are complementary to each other, with the former encouraging the community to participate in the safeguarding and promotion of ICH in comprehensive projects at the community level, while the latter are designed for areas not covered by the “Community-driven Projects”. The ICH Funding Scheme seeks to record, safeguard, transmit and promote Hong Kong’s ICH by different means and channels by supporting a diverse variety of projects.



## Community-driven Projects

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The ICH Office launched the first round of “Community-driven Projects” in 2019, which was widely welcomed with 91 applications received. After evaluation by the Assessment Panel under the ICH Advisory Committee, a total of 22 applications were granted funds (excluding 3 cancelled projects as at April 2021). The second round of “Community-driven Projects” was launched in 2020. Despite the impact of COVID-19, 76 applications were received and eventually 23 projects were granted funds (excluding 2 cancelled projects as at April 2021).

The funded projects involve different ICH items and the nature of the projects is diverse. Some projects focus on community and educational activities, with grantees promoting ICH to the public and students through their own networks. For example, grantees make use of their own network in schools to introduce ICH items to students with the participation of bearers. Some projects are training courses, in which ICH bearers teach participants the skills and techniques to enrich participants’ understanding of and raise their interest in ICH items, so as to achieve the aim of transmission of ICH. In addition, there are also projects related to the organisation of traditional festivals. These festivals rely on the financial support of the community to continue, and many of them are faced with difficulties when it comes to transmission. Support from the ICH Funding Scheme has eased the financial pressure of organising these festivals, enabling traditional festivals to continue.

## Partnership Projects

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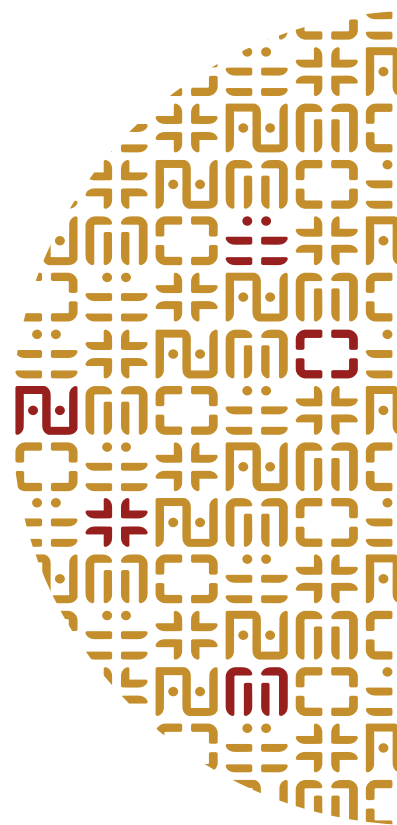
The “Partnership Projects” launched two rounds of applications in 2019 and 2020. A total of 24 applications were received in 2019 and 12 applications were granted funds after evaluation. The “Partnership Projects 2020” received 58 applications, 14 of which were granted funds (excluding one cancelled project as at April 2021). The funded projects from the two rounds can be categorised into three types: research, publication and public and educational activities:

### (I) Research

Two projects launched are the “Survey and Research for Enriching the ICH Inventory of Hong Kong” and “Survey of ICH of Different Groups in Hong Kong”. The objective of the former project is to conduct research into ICH-related items proposed by the public and ICH Office; the latter is a project to conduct a comprehensive survey of the ICH of non-Chinese groups living in Hong Kong. The research output of the two projects will be put before the ICH Advisory Committee for consideration as to whether the relevant ICH items should be included in the ICH inventory.

### (II) Publication

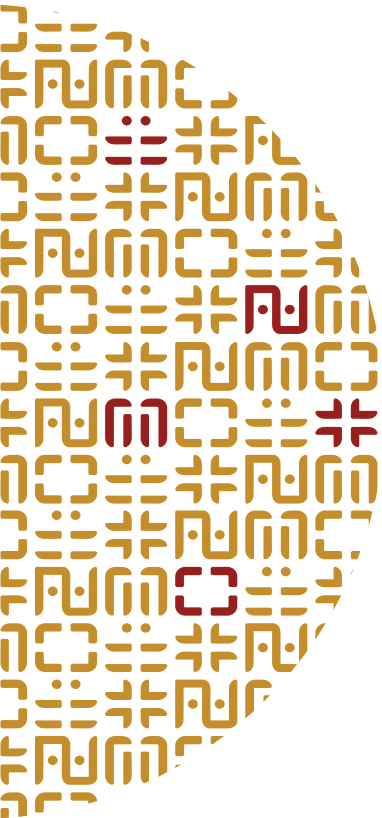
The projects entitled “Research into and Publication of the Items of the Representative List of the ICH of Hong Kong” and the “Monograph Series on ICH of Hong Kong” have been launched as part of the Partnership Projects. The former project aims to conduct in-depth research into and publish monographs for 20 items from the List of ICH Representatives, 17 items of which have been granted to successful applicants. The latter project will conduct research into and publish monographs on the theme “Hong Kong ICH in the Natural and Cultural Settings of Lingnan” to explore how Hong Kong ICH may relate to the natural and cultural environment at a macro level. These publications will further enrich existing ICH works and materials, so that the public can gain a better understanding of ICH and the knowledge regarding ICH can be disseminated more widely.



### (III) Public and Educational Activities

The “Partnership Projects” has launched the projects “ICH Mobile Centre”, “ICH Hub”, “ICH Domain” and “ICH for All”, the contents of which include a mobile exhibition vehicle, an ICH exhibition gallery, a series of ICH experience activities for schools and people with special needs, etc. All of these aim to introduce ICH to the public and students through different means and as a result encourage participation from all walks of life.

## Achievement

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In 2019 and 2020, a total of 71 projects were funded by the ICH Funding Scheme, most of which are still in progress. The contents of these projects include different types of activities, such as promotion activities for communities and schools, transmission courses, large-scale activities of a one-off nature, research and publication, etc. The ICH Funding Scheme is achieving its aim through different levels of protection, transmission and promotion work relating to ICH.

### (I) Community Promotion

The ICH Funding Scheme has strengthened the promotion of ICH at the community level and enhanced public awareness of ICH. Among the “Community-driven Projects”, there are a number of activities held in the community, such as “Searching for the Past: Ancestral Worship in Hong Kong Promotion Scheme”, “Promotion and Educational Project of Hong Kong’s ICH in 18 Districts”, the “Transmission Programmes of ‘Dishui Nanyin’”, “The Production and Transmission of Guangdong Hand Puppets”. The projects “ICH Hub” and “ICH for All” from the “Partnership Projects” also aim to bring ICH into the community as well as different groups (such as persons with disabilities) in order to arouse the attention of different parties of society for ICH.

### (II) School Promotion

Through the “Community-driven Projects” and “Partnership Projects”, the ICH Funding Scheme cooperates with groups, organisations and experts experienced in school educational activities, hoping to bring ICH into the campus and provide more opportunities for young people to learn about ICH. Examples include “The Art of Paper Crafting: The Past and the Future” and “Immersive Theatre of ICH” supported by the “Community-driven Projects”, as well as the “ICH Mobile Centre”, the “Picture Book Series on the ICH of Hong Kong” and the “ICH Domain” supported by the “Partnership Projects”.

### **(III) Transmission Courses**

To transmit ICH from generation to generation, it is necessary to train new blood to the ICH items. Another objective of the ICH Funding Scheme is to strengthen the role of community organisations, tertiary institutions and ICH bearers in transmitting ICH, as well as to launch transmission courses, such as the “Preservation and Promotion Project of Hong Kong Traditional Paper craftsmanship” and “Courses and database on the Cheongsam”, so that the public can acquire ICH-related knowledge and skills more easily.

### **(IV) Major Events**

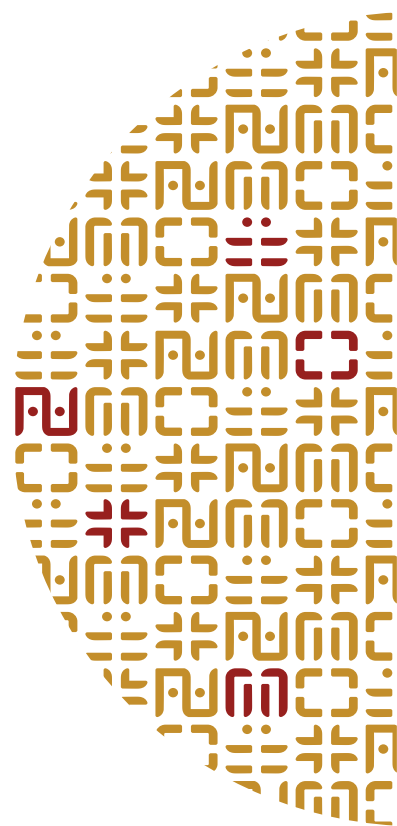
The ICH Funding Scheme also supports projects to introduce ICH to the public in the form of large-scale cultural programmes, such as the “ICH Mart”, “Yu Lan Cultural Festival”, “Hakka Cultural Festival” and “Ap Lei Chau Hung Shing Culture Festival”, which turn ICH into a shared resource for society and help the public learn about ICH in a leisurely and fun way.

### **(V) Research and Publication**

The research and publication projects systematically record and analyse information related to ICH, which serves as an important basis for the safeguarding and promotion of ICH in the future. In addition to the research into and publication of monographs under the “Partnership Projects”, the publishing and recording projects supported by the “Community-driven Projects” include the “Three Yu Lan Festivals: Research, Transmission and Promotion” and “History and Social Context of the Tai Hang Fire Dragon Dance: Oral History Recording and Publication Project”. The ICH Funding Scheme supports related projects and shares detailed research achievements, so that the public can have a deepened understanding of ICH.

### **(VI) Safeguarding ICH**

The ICH Funding Scheme provides financial support for the operation of ICH items, such as local traditional festivals including the Yu Lan Festivals, Tin Hau Festivals, Mid-Autumn Fire Dragon Dance at Pok Fu Lam and Ancestor Worship of the Kwok Clan in Kowloon City supported by the “Community-driven Projects”, so that these ICH items can be transmitted.



## The Impact of COVID-19

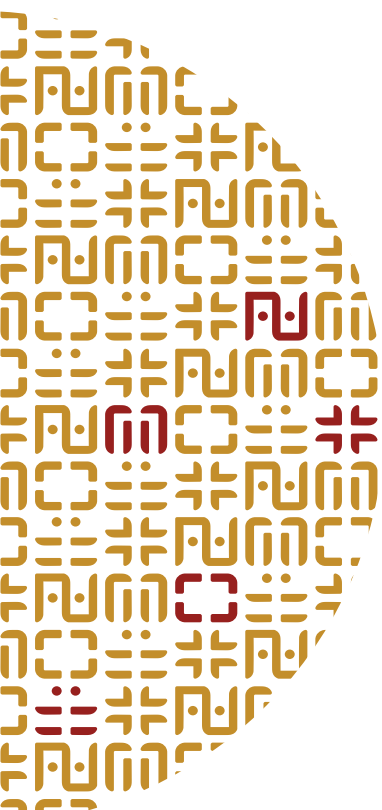
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The situation of the COVID-19 pandemic has been serious since the beginning of 2020. To reduce the risk of community infection, the government has implemented a series of measures, including social distancing, limiting the size of public gatherings, suspension of school classes as well as the closure of cultural and recreational facilities. A number of public activities cannot go on as usual subsequently .

ICH activities rely very much on the interaction between people. Some of the funded projects, particularly the public and educational activities as well as transmission courses, have had to be postponed or scaled down because of the pandemic. Some projects have even been cancelled.

The progress of funded research and publication projects has also been hindered by the downscaling or cancellation of the activities relating to research subject and the suspension of interviews during the pandemic.

Although the funded projects under the ICH Funding Scheme have been affected to varying degrees, 3 projects were completed by the end of 2019 and the beginning of 2020. (Please refer to [Appendix VI](#) for list of projects completed.) However, it has been necessary to adjust the scale of the projects and cancel some of the project content due to the recent social events and the early stage of the pandemic. In view of this, the ICH Funding Scheme has dealt with projects affected by the pandemic with a flexible and pragmatic approach, such as allowing the postponement and cancellation of some of the content of the projects. The ICH office will closely monitor the progress of each project and maintain close communication with the grantees to provide appropriate assistance and recommendation.



# The Way Forward

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The ICH Funding Scheme will continue to support different types of projects and deepen the research into, and safeguarding and promotion of local ICH:

## **(I) Public and Educational Activities**

To organise activities in different forms and via different channels by integrating ICH into daily life to enhance the public's and students' understanding of ICH.

## **(II) Transmission Courses**

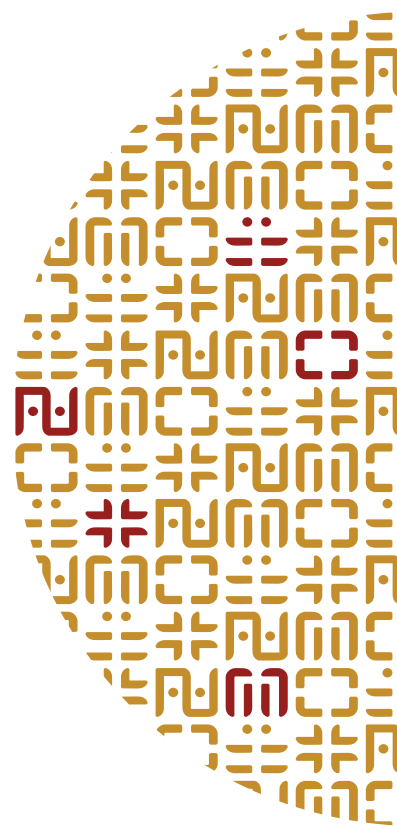
To strengthen the provision of ICH training activities to enhance the public's knowledge and learning of ICH as well as raise public interest in acquiring different ICH knowledge and skills, in order to inject vitality into the development of ICH.

## **(III) Continuation of ICH**

To provide support to ICH bearers and bearer organisations and encourage them to organise ICH-related activities in order to popularise and transmit ICH throughout the community.

## **(IV) Research and Publication**

To promote research into and publication of ICH, not only for the compilation of records, but also for the promotion of ICH on a broad basis.
